Perceived Risk - Reality



I will make a mistake on the application – If it is a good project the grantor will work with you to correct any omissions or errors in the application



I will disappoint my leadership and community by not being successful – **Doing something is better than doing nothing**



My other duties will not get done – Your other duties will always be there, the grant opportunity will not



What if we are awarded, I wouldn't know how to manage the grant – *Cross that bridge when you get there*

Focusing only on state pass-through dollars







RAISE Grant - Allowability

Eligible Project Types:

- Highway or bridge projects (eligible under title 23 US Code)
- Public transportation projects (eligible under chapter 53, title 49 US Code)
- Passenger and freight rail transportation projects (eligible under title 49 US Code)
- Port Infrastructure Investments
- Surface transportation components of an airport project (eligible under part B, subtitle VII, title 49 US Code)
- Intermodal projects whose components are otherwise an eligible project type
- Projects to replace or rehabilitate a culvert or prevent stormwater runoff for the purpose of improving habitat for aquatic species while advancing the goals of the RAISE program.
- Any other surface transportation infrastructure project that the Secretary considers to be necessary to advance the goals of the program.

RAISE Grants – Allowability Reality

- Revitalizing Main Streets
- Trails
- Rail Grade/Road Separation
- Bridges
- Downtown Mobility
- Historic Preservation
- Road Improvements/Safety
- Riverfront/Waterfront Projects
- Arts/Culture/Tourism/Economic Development

Keys to Matching Project Ideas to Funding

- Develop a grants plan that reflects entity wide priorities
- Keep inventory of community needs and desired projects
- Develop tools and processes to identify a potential "capital stack"
- Track funding opportunities on a regular basis
